Democracy: Next Generation Governance focuses on the role of youth in reshaping democratic and cultural governance for a more inclusive and sustainable future. As young people across Europe and beyond demand deeper participation, climate justice, and systemic change, this session explores how institutions can respond - not just by listening, but by sharing power.

We will explore how cultural spaces can become platforms for youth-led decision-making and intergenerational collaboration. What structures and mindsets are needed to move beyond symbolic inclusion toward genuine empowerment? This session invites participants to reflect on how to embed youth perspectives at the core of governance and build democratic practices that are future-facing, equitable, and rooted in care.

In a time of rising polarisation, this session addresses the urgent need to confront postcolonial legacies, open the space to discuss contested heritage, and give a voice to communities silenced in dominant historical accounts.

How can memory practices reflect the diversity of lived experiences and challenge systems of exclusion? What role do cultural actors play in reclaiming space for marginalised voices

and building more democratic narratives of belonging? Through an intersectional lens, we will examine how issues of race, gender, class, and geography intersect in shaping both memory and representation and explore pathways toward more just and plural cultural memory work.

We are in times of big changes and crises: it looks like the traditional approach to advocacy doesn't work anymore. This session is about sharing and learning, which could be the strategies for an effective advocacy action in the field of cultural and art sector today. How can we learn from each other new approaches and trajectories? Which are the necessary words that can lead us? Which language should we speak to find a good communication ground? Which tools?

Starting from the experiences of the organisations in the room, we will share questions and examples to help each one to find new possible solutions. Together, we will create a collective glossary of necessary words for advocacy today and a description of useful tools. After the session, we would like to have a follow-up in some months, to continue the sharing. The glossary and the tools will be shared with all the participants.

The session can be relevant for those who want to learn more about advocacy, for the ones who are experts but need to find new inspirations, for the ones who want to help others, towards a collective advocacy.

Youth Culture and Mental Health: towards caring and empowering ecosystems

How can cultural practices contribute to the mental wellbeing of young people in an era marked by crisis, uncertainty, digital transformation, and climate anxiety? This session will start by moving presentations by youth on the 'status quo' and opens a space for critical and generative dialogue on the intersection between youth, culture and mental health. Bringing together youth advocates, practitioners, and researchers, the session explores how cultural participation can foster a sense of belonging, agency, and emotional resilience among young people and thereby. It also reflects on the systemic changes needed on policy level and the conditions needed to sustain caring, empowering, and non-extractive environments within institutions, communities, countries and policy frameworks.

Through diverse experiences - from artistic programmes to institutional strategies and youth-led actions - the session will explore both challenges and emerging practices in the growing field of culture and mental health. Building on the wealth of experience in the room, the discussions will be fed into a Culture Action Europe position paper on "Youth, culture and mental health" to be published at the end of 2025.

It is especially relevant for cultural professionals, policy makers, educators, and youth workers seeking to co-design more responsive, inclusive, and youth-centred cultural ecosystems.

The dialogue between the forest and cultural ecosystems stimulates reflection and new paths without seeking definitive answers. The forest metaphor can inspire innovative strategies in cultural management by considering relational networks to create lasting engagement and moving from an individual to a systemic approach. What does it look like to think, feel and behave like a forest in cultural management practices? The session will be especially interesting for those working for and with teenagers and, more generally, for all those interested in transforming their cultural management practices through a deeper understanding of how natural ecosystems work.

Female gazes

Public spaces and heritage sites remain battlegrounds where women, non-binary individuals, and marginalised communities are systematically erased, both physically and symbolically. This session confronts the urgent need to transform urban landscapes through intersectional feminist practices that centre lived experience over dominant historical narratives.

How do we co-create art and activism that not only occupies public space but redefines who it serves? What tools—from participatory soundwalks to community-led research—can amplify underrepresented voices in urban planning and cultural policymaking? We'll explore how collaborative artistic interventions challenge exclusionary systems, foster social cohesion, and turn temporary acts of resistance into lasting structural change. Join us to strategise inclusive futures where feminist gazes reshape belonging, access, and collective power in the cities we share.

What happens when the arts transform institutions from within? This session explores how artistic practices - especially those rooted in care, co-creation, and embodied participation - can act as catalysts for deep organisational change in cultural organisations. These practices do not simply add value to institutions from the outside. They have a wider impact: they challenge the way cultural organisations think about care, leadership, authorship, and the ecology of their internal processes. They question hierarchies, open up decision-making, and reshape the rhythms of institutional life.

Starting from the experience of Dance Well and opening up to other perspectives in the fields of socially engaged art, health, and applied performance, the session invites participants to reflect on how cultural institutions can move differently - becoming more inclusive, relational, and responsive.

The session is especially relevant for those working in or with cultural organisations who are interested in understanding how artistic processes can trigger structural transformation and support long-term sustainability and democratic governance.

The Disorderly Women Alliance was initiated in 2018, promotes and supports women working in leadership roles in the cultural sector in Europe by encouraging solidarity, raising visibility and empowering established and emerging generations. This session will be curated by its three founders and will explore the journey from the personal to the professional, ultimately leading to the political, as we examine the challenges and opportunities women face in leadership roles within the cultural sector. We will engage in discussions around the following key questions: What are the key obstacles and hidden barriers that women encounter on their path to leadership model exist? How can we foster greater equity in the sector, from addressing wage gaps to overcoming recruitment biases? How can we support the growth of emerging female leaders?

This participatory session offers an embodied encounter with Dance Well, an artistic practice originally developed with and for people living with Parkinson's, and now expanded to a wider community across Europe. Rooted in the belief that everyone has the right to dance, Dance Well challenges conventional ideas of authorship, inclusion, and cultural participation. It proposes a radical, embodied, and horizontal approach to working together, redefining how we move, care, and create within and beyond cultural institutions. Through guided improvisation and collective movement, participants will experience dance as a space of agency, interdependence, and community-building.

Beyond its inclusive aesthetics, Dance Well also operates as a vehicle for organisational transformation, shaping new ways of working, redistributing leadership, and expanding the role of cultural institutions. This session will resonate with artists, cultural managers, educators and policy-makers interested in socially engaged artistic practices; rethinking impact and evaluation beyond metrics; fostering embodied, collective and situated leadership; and exploring dance as a space of care and institutional imagination.

Commitment to a Greener Gathering

For the second year, Culture Action Europe has obtained the <u>SHIFT eco-certificate</u>. The eco-guidelines provide a clear framework for effective climate action specific to cultural networks. The SHIFT Eco-Guidelines recognise and address the ecological footprint associated with operating international cultural networks and platform organisations. The guidelines serve as a reference document that aims to minimise their footprint, optimise environmentally sustainable practices, and act as an example of good practice for their members and other networks. They are purposely made openly accessible in the hope they can inspire structural organisational change in the cultural sectors, in the broadest sense. We're making sustainability a priority and invite you to do the same:

Take the train whenever possible – especially for trips under 600km or under 5 hours.

Skip indirect flights – even if they are cheaper. If your destination is tricky to reach, try to connect by land instead of flying internally.

Avoid solo car travel – consider carpooling or alternative modes.

Give yourself more time to travel – sustainable options might take longer, but they're worth it. If you can, stay a bit longer and combine your trip with other meetings or visits.

All catering is vegetarian – with vegan options available. No meat or fish is served.

We prioritise ethical food sourcing – favouring organic, fair trade, and local produce, ideally from community-based or small-scale providers.

Reduce waste – Avoid disposable tableware, bring a reusable tote for any purchases, and sort waste properly using Turin's recycling system.

Save energy where you can – switch off devices when not in use and use venue Wi-Fi instead of mobile data.

Bring your own bottle and mug – tap water in Turin is clean and safe to drink, and there are refill stations throughout the city.

Community Values

BEYOND 2025: Being Many is an invitation to exchange, collaborate, and rethink how we come together. Co-hosted by Culture Action Europe, Club Silencio and Fondazione Fitzcarraldo, this gathering is shaped by collective participation, openness, and the richness of diverse perspectives.

We believe it's important to create an environment that nurtures dialogue, listening, and shared responsibility. To cultivate an inclusive and open gathering that is reflective of the values we uphold, we invite participants to embrace the following principles:

- Make space for others, listen actively, and engage with curiosity and care. Allow all speakers and participants to complete their statements without interruption. Respect that many in the room may not be speaking in their native language.
- Use the language that individuals prefer when referring to their gender, disability, or identity. If in doubt, ask respectfully.
- Recognise that we all bring unique histories, traditions, and ways of knowing to the conversation. Embrace moments of challenge and contradiction, recognising that the diversity of thought enriches our collective exploration.
- If someone is using access support, communicate directly with them. If a participant is using a wheelchair, be mindful of your physical positioning in conversation.
- Respect personal space. Always ask for permission before physical contact or moving into someone's space.
- Self care is community care! Take breaks and recharge as you need to be able to sustain yourself and energy inside and outside of the gathering.

Practicalities & Logistics

Confirmed Locations

Sermig

Piazza Borgo Dora, 61, 10152 Torino

Sermig (Servizio Missionario Giovani), is a former military arsenal transformed into a space for social initiatives, cultural events, and community projects.

Getting There & Accessibility

Sermig is about a 20-minute walk from the city center, or approximately 10 minutes by bike or taxi. It is well-served by multiple bus lines (11, 19, 50, 51, 92) and tram line 4, with stops at Borgo Dora and Emilia.

Entry to the venue is via the main gate, which provides step-free access to the first courtyard. From there, follow the signed outdoor corridor through a second courtyard and continue along the open-air path to reach the event area, where the registration desk will be located. Bathrooms are situated directly opposite the registration desk. There are two accessible bathrooms. All bathrooms are gender-separated, and a shower is also available.

All main event spaces, including the rooms used for sessions and catering, are located on the ground floor and are fully step-free. The corridors throughout the venue are wide and open-air. Designated accessibility seating will be available in the front rows of the main room. The indoor space is equipped with air conditioning. These main rooms are bright and open onto an inner garden courtyard with grass. This garden space will be accessible throughout the event and can be used as an area to relax.

Please note: One of the rooms used for a parallel session on Friday afternoon is located upstairs and does **not** have step-free access. Details about the session scheduled in this room will be shared once the programme is finalised.

La Centrale Nuvola Lavazza

P <u>Via Ancona, 11/A, 10152 Torino</u>

La Centrale Lavazza is a contemporary event space within the Lavazza headquarters, housed in a former power plant built in 1892 in the Aurora district by Turin-based engineer Ermenegildo Perini.

Getting There & Accessibility

La Centrale Nuvola Lavazza is about 1.4 km from the city center, a 20-minute walk, or approximately 10 minutes by bike or taxi. It is well-served by multiple bus lines, with the closest stops being Parma, Ancona, Regio Parco, and XI Febbraio.

To access La Centrale Lavazza, go to the official address and enter the plaza from the street. Follow the path diagonally to the right, passing a concrete bench. Continue toward the doorway of the building located to the right of the white building.

The entrance is step-free. Upon entry, you'll walk through a hallway that leads directly to the main room, which features high ceilings and overhead lighting from spotlights. Designated accessible seating will be available. The venue provides accessible bathrooms and free Wi-Fi. The indoor space is equipped with air conditioning.

The Lavazza complex features an outdoor area with a fountain, trees, and benches, offering a space to relax between sessions.

EDIT Torino

P <u>Piazza Teresa Noce 15/A 10155 Torino</u>

EDIT Torino's goal is a social hub of hospitality where you can eat, drink, sleep and enjoy yourself, and where cultural, social, and food & beverage-related initiatives are born and welcomed.

Getting There & Accessibility

EDIT Torino is well-connected by public transport. Buses 46, 49, 50, 51, and 77 stop nearby, with the closest stops being Crispi Sud, Cigna, and Vigevano. The venue is also reachable by taxi in approximately 10–15 minutes from the city centre.

There are two entrances to EDIT Torino. For the welcome dinner, please use the gate on the right-hand side, located in front of the circular bench area. This entrance is stepfree and leads directly into the courtyard, where the registration desk will be right in front of you. The indoor bathroom area has a few steps, but a ramp is available for wheelchair users. While the doors are relatively light, they may require assistance to open due to limited maneuvering space at the ramp entrance. The corridor to the bathrooms is dimly lit but wide enough for easy access.

Please note: there are no fully wheel-chair accessible lavatories at this venue. Bathrooms are gender-separated, and the interior is painted dark red, which may make the space appear dim.

Museo della Montagna

Piazzale Monte dei Cappuccini, 7, 10131 Torino

The Museo Nazionale della Montagna showcases the history, culture, and exploration of the mountains, with exhibitions on alpinism, environmental conservation, and mountain photography. Located on Monte dei Cappuccini, it offers panoramic views of Turin.

Getting There & Accessibility

The museum is partially accessible, with some areas requiring assistance due to its hilltop location.

It is reachable by bus 52, 61, 70 (Stop: Monte dei Cappuccini) or a scenic 25-minute walk from the city center. Cycling is possible, but the uphill route can be challenging. A taxi ride from the Aurora neighborhood takes about 15 minutes. **Please note** that a dedicated shuttle will be available to take participants from Piazza Vittorio – Gran Madre up to the hills for the event.

<u>Dorado</u>

P Lungo Dora Firenze, 37, 10152 Torino TO, Italy

Dorado is a cultural and social space along the Dora River. It hosts concerts, workshops, and community events. The space includes an outdoor area and an indoor café.

Getting There & Accessibility

Dorado is only 170 meters away from La Centrale Lavazza, about a 2-minute walk.

Please note that the entrance to this venue has a single step approximately 15 cm high. The location spans two floors. Upon entry, the session space is immediately to your left. It is a spacious area with ample natural light, and additional spaces available for relaxing. A staircase provides access to the second floor, which features a co-working area. This area may be used as additional space in case of high attendance; however, the upper floor is not accessible. The venue has one bathroom, which is not accessible. Please note that this location is not equipped with air conditioning.

After your session, you can take a stroll along the riverbank of the Dora Riparia!

Cecchi Point

P <u>Via Antonio Cecchi, 17, 10152 Torino</u>

Cecchi Point is a multifunctional space that hosts a variety of cultural and community events, including workshops, exhibitions, and performances. It features both indoor and outdoor areas for public use.

Getting There & Accessibility

Cecchi Point is located 550 meters, or approximately an 8-minute walk, from Sermig, on the opposite side of the river.

The main entrance to Cecchi Point is step-free and opens into an open-air courtyard with multiple buildings. Once inside, proceed straight ahead, and after passing two wooden benches, the space we will be using will be on your left. Bathrooms are located at the end of the corridor, on the opposite side of the entrance. The corridor can feel a bit dim, the toilets are gender-separated, with accessible lavatories available. Please note that this location is not equipped with air conditioning.

The outdoor courtyard is open to the public and offers accessible seating areas, providing a relaxing space to enjoy during breaks.

<u>Via Baltea</u>

P <u>Via Baltea, 3, 10154 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Via Baltea is a venue that hosts cultural events, exhibitions, and community activities. It is located near the Dora River, providing a unique space for art, performance, and social gatherings.

Getting There & Accessibility

Via Baltea is 1.6 km from La Centrale Nuvola Lavazza, about a 23-minute walk or 7 minutes by bike. Alternatively, you can take Bus 27 from Ancona stop, get off at Sesia stop, and walk about 300 meters to reach the venue.

You can access this venue through the main entrance—a large blue gate—which provides step-free access. After entering, a corridor leads directly to the courtyard. The session will take place in the Salone, located on the ground floor. It is the second door on your right after entering. Please note that this location does not offer accessible bathrooms, and the indoor area is not equipped with air conditioning.

Ex-Cimitero di San Pietro in Vincoli

P <u>Via San Pietro in Vincoli, 10152 Torino</u>

Ex-Cimitero di San Pietro in Vincoli is a historic site that was once a cemetery and is now a location for cultural and community events. The site is known for its peaceful atmosphere and historical significance.

Getting There & Accessibility

Ex-Cimitero di San Pietro in Vincoli is **1.2 km** from La Centrale Lavazza, about a **17minute walk** or **7 minutes by bike**. Alternatively, you can take **Bus 19** from **XI Febbraio** stop, get off at **Borgo Dora**, and walk another 9 minutes to reach the venue.

You can enter this space through the main metal gate, which opens into a large, partially green rectangular courtyard. A central stone path leads to the opposite side, where the old chapel—our session venue—is located on the left, with the gate behind you.

The chapel is step-free and features a narrow yet spacious layout, with high ceilings and ample lighting. The seating consists of three rows of benches accessible by steps, with the first row slightly elevated. Accessible seating can be arranged if needed.

The courtyard of the chapel is peaceful and shaded by arches, offering cover from rain. There are also sofas available for seating, providing a comfortable area to relax.

The indoor area is not equipped with air conditioning.

Borealis

P <u>Via San Giovanni Battista La Salle, 17/A, 10152 Torino</u>

Borealis is a cultural and social center located in the Aurora district of Torino. Established by Kaninchen-Haus and designed by ConiglioViola, it serves as a hub for artistic expression, community engagement, and cultural events. The center aims to foster collaboration among diverse communities and provide a space for various activities, including art exhibitions, workshops, and performances.

Getting There & Accessibility

Borealis is 300 **meters** from Sermig or around a 4 minute walk, and about 500 meters or around a 7 minute walk from La Centrale Lavazza.

This venue has step-free access and consists of three separate rooms that are all connected to each other. The specific space used will depend on the number of participants. The venue includes various interactive objects and a bar area.

Lighting in the space is generally dim, with spotlights that may be intense or alerting for some individuals. Please note that the bathrooms are **not** accessible. During the party scheduled at this location, music and sound levels may be high. The space can feel enclosed at times, depending on the number of attendees.

Bagni Pubblici di via Agliè

P <u>Via Agliè, 9, 10154 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Bagni Pubblici di via Agliè is a historic venue that hosts cultural events, performances, and workshops. It is a former public bathhouse that has been repurposed as a space for community activities and artistic exhibitions.

Getting There & Accessibility

Bagni Pubblici di via Agliè is 1.1 km from La Centrale Lavazza, about a 17-minute walk or 6 minutes by bike. Alternatively, you can take Bus 18 from the Parma stop and get off at Palermo stop, then walk another 300 meters to reach the venue.

There are two entrances to the venue:

Main entrance (via the official address): This entrance has 7 steps leading into the main hall. From here, you can access the indoor collaborative space (used only in case of

rain) and the outdoor courtyard via a staircase. An elevator is also available to move between indoor and outdoor areas.

Step-free entrance (Via Barbania 4C, 10154 Torino TO): This grey metal gate leads directly into the outdoor courtyard with step-free access. The outdoor courtyard is where the session will take place if the weather allows.

The space is well-lit and offers ample room for movement. Lavatories are located in the indoor workspace and can be reached from the courtyard via the staircase or elevator. One accessible bathroom is available and includes a baby changing table.

After the session at this venue concludes, you are welcome to enjoy a lunch break before making your way back to <u>Sermig</u> for our closing session. Please refer to the directions provided for more details on how to reach this venue.

Salotto di Miranda

P <u>Via Carlo Michele Buscalioni, 19, 10153 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Salotto di Miranda is a community space located along Viale Buscalioni. It is a social and cultural hub, designed to foster connection and creativity through workshops, events, and social gatherings. The space offers a cozy and inviting atmosphere for the local community to come together.

Getting There & Accessibility

Salotto di Miranda is **1.1 km** from La Centrale Lavazza, about a **15 minutes walk** or 6 **minutes by bike**. Alternatively, you can take **Bus 19** from XI Febbraio stop, which is a 6 minutes walk away, get off at Verona stop, and walk another 200 meters to reach the venue.

This venue is a small glass structure located within a publicly accessible green median. The surrounding green space, which includes trees and a peaceful atmosphere, will be used for the session if weather permits. Chairs will be provided for outdoor seating.

Access to the area includes a single step, and there are no ramps available. If the session must be held indoors due to weather, please note that the interior space is limited. There are **no bathroom facilities** available at this location.

OFF TOPIC

P <u>Via Giorgio Pallavicino, 35, 10153 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Off Topic is a cultural and social space in Torino, offering various areas for coworking, artistic performances, workshops, and community events. The venue is a hub for creative individuals and groups, with spaces dedicated to contemporary art, theater, and music.

Getting There & Accessibility

Off Topic is located 1.5 km from La Centrale Lavazza, approximately a 21-minute walk or a 6-minute bike ride. For a more scenic route, you can opt to walk along the riverbank. Alternatively, you can walk 450 meters to the *XI Febbraio* stop (across the river), take **Bus 19**, get off at *Campus Einaudi*, and walk another 500 meters to reach the venue.

Access is through the main gate, which is the only entrance. A slight ramp leads into an inner courtyard with tables and chairs. The session will take place in the room immediately to your right upon entry. This L-shaped space is well-lit but **not equipped** with air conditioning.

Bathrooms are located inside the main building. Please note that the doors may feel a bit heavy; once inside, the bathrooms are on the left. **Accessible toilets** are available at this location.

A bistro is on site, where you can enjoy a meal or a refreshing drink before or after your session.

Spazio BAC

P <u>Via S. Giuseppe Benedetto Cottolengo, 24 bis, 10152 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Spazio BAC is a contemporary art space in Torino that hosts exhibitions, performances, and cultural events. It is dedicated to promoting new artistic practices and fostering a dialogue between local and international artists.

Getting There & Accessibility

Spazio BAC is **900 meters** from Sermig, about a **12-minute walk** or 5 **minutes by bike**.

To enter, use the main building entrance, which features a small ramp leading into the courtyard. From the courtyard, proceed to a door on your left. The session space is accessed through this door, down a metal staircase, and to your right.

For accessibility, there is a second back entrance with a stairlift that provides access to the lower level. Please inform the team if you require use of this access.

The space has high ceilings and is well-lit. Accessible bathrooms and a child changing table are available. Please note that the venue is **not equipped with air conditioning**.

Transportation

Getting to Turin

CAE encourages participants to consider sustainable travel options whenever possible. If feasible, we recommend traveling by train, bus, or carpooling to reduce environmental impact.

By Train

Turin is well-connected by trains, with Torino Porta Susa and Torino Porta Nuova linking major cities around Italy. Direct international routes are available from France, Switzerland, and Germany.

Please visit <u>Trenitalia</u> for national and international connections. For additional highspeed rail options, check <u>Italo</u>. If travelling internationally, you can explore route options on <u>Eurail</u>.

By Bus / Coach

International and domestic buses connect Turin with major European cities. <u>FlixBus</u>, <u>BlaBlaCar</u> and <u>Itabus</u> offer routes from various destinations, with stops at Vittorio Emanuele station, Torino Lingotto stations and Stura station (check which one is closer to your hotel).

By Car / Carpooling

Turin has direct motorway connections to France, Switzerland, and the rest of Italy. If driving, consider carpooling to share travel costs and reduce emissions. Platforms like <u>BlaBlaCar</u> offer shared rides between European cities.

Please note that paid parking is required in most areas of Turin. Check with your accommodation for options or use public garages near the city center.

If you plan on traveling by car, we encourage you to meet up with other BEYOND participants to save on costs and minimise our carbon emissions.

By Air

If train travel is not an option, you can book a **direct flight** to Torino Caselle Airport (TRN) whenever possible to minimise emissions.

Getting Around Turin

By Foot

Turin is a walkable city, with many key locations, cultural venues, and historic sites within easy reach. The city center is pedestrian-friendly, making walking an enjoyable and convenient way to explore.

By Bike

Cycling is great for short distances. The city is improving its bike lanes, though some areas still require sharing the road with traffic. Bike rentals and shared mobility services like Bolt, Lime, Ridemovi, and Dott are available throughout the city.

Public Transport

If walking isn't an option, public transport is the best alternative. Turin has a reliable network of buses, trams, and a metro line.

Tickets (\in 1,90 digital / \in 2,00 chip on paper medium) are valid 100 min with unlimited transfers. Purchase at metro stations, kiosks, tobacco shops, or use contactless payment on board. Note that it is possible to pay by card on the bus, in which case the ticket costs \in 1.50. However, not all buses are equipped with card payment terminals.

- MultiCity €11.80: MultiCity ride-city-ticket electronic carnet, available on a chip-on-paper medium;
- Daily €3.70 (digital) / €4.50 (chip-on-paper): Daily ticket available in digital format or on a chip-on-paper medium;
- MultiDaily 7 €21.00: Electronic carnet containing 7 daily tickets;

Daily x4 - \in 12.00 (digital) / \in 14.80 (chip-on-paper): Ticket valid for a group of up to 4 people traveling together.

Buses & Trams: Frequent services operated by GTT.

Metro: A single automated line linking key districts. Operates from 05:30 to 00:00.

Rooted in DIY ethos, they democratize storytelling, making them vital to social movements <u>across the world</u>.

Zines provide a unique platform for self-expression, using different media—writing, drawing, photography, collages—to explore ideas or share personal experiences. By making a zine together, we embrace this form of creative expression as a way to not only amplify individual voices but also foster a sense of collective creativity.

Throughout the BEYOND gathering, we will be discussing how we challenge individualism and rethink governance models. Whether you contribute a poem, a sketch, a photograph, or a short reflection, your addition will help shape the larger story of what it means to "be many."

How to Get Involved

As you are engaging at BEYOND 2025, channel your reflections, questions and inspiration into creative energy. All contributions are welcome! The zine is open to any type of creative contribution, but here is some inspiration for how you can participate:

Where to have breakfast?

Near La Centrale of the complex Nuvola Lavazza:

Café BLOOM

P Via Catania, 21/A, 10153 Torino TO, Italy

Description

Café Bloom is a charming café and bistro located in Turin's Borgo Rossini district. Known for its cozy atmosphere adorned with plants and books, it offers a welcoming environment for breakfast, brunch, lunch, and afternoon tea. Bar del Balôn is accessible via a step-free entrance, accommodating guests with reduced mobility. The seating area is modest in size, offering both indoor and outdoor options.

From Sermig, the bar is about a 3-minute walk. Head northwest on Piazza Borgo Dora toward Via Andreis, continue onto Via Borgo Dora, and the bar will be on your left.

Pescheria Gallina

Piazza della Repubblica, 14/B, 10122 Torino TO, Italy

Pescheria Gallina is a historic fish market and eatery located in Turin's Porta Palazzo market. Established in 1920, it has become a symbol of fresh seafood in the city. During market hours, Pescheria Gallina operates as a fishmonger, offering a wide variety of fresh fish and seafood. Additionally, it serves as a street bistro, providing patrons with freshly prepared seafood dishes to enjoy on-site.

Getting There & Accessibility

Pescheria Gallina is situated within the bustling Porta Palazzo market and is accessible to visitors with reduced mobility. The seating is primarily outdoor and may be limited during peak hours.

From Sermig, the pescheria is approximately a 10-minute walk. Head northwest on Piazza Borgo Dora toward Via Andreis, continue onto Via Borgo Dora, turn left onto Piazza della Repubblica, and the destination will be on your right.

→ If you're looking for a drink or some appetizers...

Head over to the Quadrilatero Romano, one of the most popular areas in Turin for aperitivo and nightlife. Nestled between Via Garibaldi and the ancient Roman walls, this lively neighborhood is full of bars, small bistros, and cocktail spots. Locals, students, and visitors gather here for spritzes, natural wines, and sharing plates in a charming mix of cobbled streets and historic architecture. Aperitivo in the Quadrilatero? It's a must.

Spots to eat across the city:

Magazzini Oz

P <u>Via Giolitti, 19/A, 10123 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Magazzini Oz is a multifaceted social enterprise that combines a restaurant, café, and emporium. The venue is dedicated to excellence in dining and retail while promoting social inclusion through training and employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities, refugees, and disadvantaged backgrounds. The restaurant offers a diverse menu featuring international dishes, and the café provides a selection of beverages and pastries in a cozy setting.

Getting There & Accessibility

MagazziniOz is fully accessible, with step-free entry and facilities designed to accommodate visitors with reduced mobility. For specific accessibility inquiries or assistance, it's advisable to contact the venue in advance.

From Aurora, Magazzini Oz is approximately a 20-minute walk or a 10-minute bike ride. Public transport options include Tram 4 from "Porta Palazzo Sud" to "Bertola," followed by a short walk to the venue.

Caffè Mulassano

Piazza Castello, 15, 10123 Torino TO, Italy

Founded in 1907, Caffè Mulassano is credited with inventing the *tramezzino*, Italy's beloved triangular sandwich. With over 30 varieties, it's the perfect spot for a quick bite in an elegant Liberty-style interior that captures the charm of early 20th-century Turin.

Getting There & Accessibility

The café is small and may present some access limitations for visitors with reduced mobility. We recommend calling ahead for specific assistance.

From Aurora, it's about a 20-minute walk or 10-minute bike ride. Alternatively, take Tram 4 from "Porta Palazzo Sud" to "Castello" and walk a few steps.

Caffè Al Bicerin

Piazza della Consolata, 5, 10122 Torino TO, Italy

Since 1763, Caffè Al Bicerin has served the iconic *bicerin*, a layered drink made of espresso, chocolate, and cream. Its small, historic interior still features original furnishings and exudes timeless charm.

Getting There & Accessibility

Due to its historic layout, the café is quite narrow and may be difficult to access for those with mobility challenges. We suggest contacting the venue in advance.

From Aurora, it's about a 10-minute walk or 5-minute bike ride. You can also take Bus 11 to "Consolata," then walk a short distance.

Farmacia del Cambio

Piazza Carignano, 2, 10123 Torino TO, Italy

Farmacia del Cambio is a refined gourmet boutique and café set inside a beautifully restored historic pharmacy. Once an actual apothecary, the space now blends heritage charm with contemporary elegance. In the morning, it's the perfect spot for a breakfast — don't miss their signature cube cornetto, a modern twist on the classic croissant. Later in the day, you can enjoy beautifully crafted pastries, light lunch options, and artisanal snacks, all served with impeccable attention to detail.

Getting There & Accessibility

Farmacia del Cambio is accessible for visitors with reduced mobility, with step-free entry and comfortable interior space.

From Aurora, it's a 20-minute walk or 10-minute bike ride. You can also take Bus 11 to "Carignano" and walk a couple of minutes.

Circolo dei Lettori

📍 <u>Via Giambattista Bogino, 9, 10123 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Housed in the stunning 18th-century Palazzo Graneri della Roccia, Circolo dei Lettori is one of Turin's most charming cultural hubs. More than just a literary center, it's a space where history, culture, and community meet. You can attend book presentations, talks, and exhibitions — or simply settle in with a coffee to read, work, or reflect in one of its beautifully furnished salons. With its frescoed ceilings, quiet corners, and refined atmosphere, it's the perfect escape in the heart of the city for anyone seeking inspiration.

Getting There & Accessibility

The building includes elevators and accessible restrooms. For specific needs, it's best to contact the venue in advance.

From Aurora, it's a 20-minute walk or 10-minute bike ride. Alternatively, take Tram 4 to "Bertola," then walk a few minutes.

Bocciofila Vanchiglietta Rami Secchi

Getting There & Accessibility

The gallery is situated on the ground floor with step-free access, making it accessible to visitors with reduced mobility. The exhibition spaces are designed to accommodate a comfortable viewing experience for all guests. For specific accessibility inquiries or assistance, visitors are encouraged to contact the gallery in advance.

CRAG – Chiono Reisova Art Gallery

Getting There & Accessibility

The gallery is located on the ground floor, providing step-free access. However, some areas may have limited accessibility due to the building's layout. Visitors with reduced mobility are encouraged to contact the gallery in advance to discuss specific needs or to arrange assistance.

VARIANTE BUNKER

P <u>Via Niccolò Paganini,0/200, 10154 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Variante Bunker is a multidisciplinary cultural space located in Barriera di Milano district of Turin. Set in a former industrial area, it hosts a wide variety of events, including parties, concerts, art exhibitions, workshops, and social gatherings. Known for its raw and vibrant atmosphere, Variante Bunker fosters creative experimentation and community engagement across generations and disciplines.

Getting There & Accessibility

Variante Bunker is mostly ground-level industrial space with step-free access throughout most areas. While the terrain may be uneven in some spots due to the building's original structure, the venue is generally accessible for visitors with reduced mobility. There is ample outdoor space and wide entrances to the main areas.

The venue is located in the northern part of Turin and is easily reachable by public transportation or bike. From Aurora, it's about a 20-minute walk or 10-minute bike ride.

MEF- Museo Ettore Fico

P <u>Via Francesco Cigna 114, 10155, Torino TO, Italy</u>

Museo Ettore Fico is a contemporary art space located in Barriera di Milano district of Turin. Housed in a former industrial building, the museum presents temporary exhibitions featuring both established and emerging artists, with a focus on experimentation and new visual languages. Its clean, minimalist design and spacious rooms offer an immersive environment for engaging with art and culture.

Getting There & Accessibility

The museum is entirely step-free and fully accessible to visitors with reduced mobility. All exhibition areas are located on the ground floor, with wide corridors and ramps where needed. The entrance is barrier-free, and accessible restrooms are available.

The MEF is approximately 15 minutes on foot or 7 minutes by bike from Aurora. It is also well connected by public transport: you can take Bus 52 or Tram 4 to "Cigna" stop, then walk a short distance to reach the museum.

Docks Dora

Le Roi Music Hall

Le Roi Music Hall, inaugurated in 1960 with interiors designed by architect Carlo Mollino, is a historic dance hall that has been a cornerstone of Turin's nightlife for decades. Known for its distinctive design, featuring colorful lamps and intricate mosaics, Le Roi hosts a variety of events, including concerts, dance nights, and private functions. The venue operates primarily during evening hours for scheduled events.

Getting There & Accessibility

The main entrance has a few steps, and while the interior is spacious, certain areas may present accessibility challenges due to the historic nature of the building. Visitors with reduced mobility are encouraged to contact the venue ahead of time to discuss specific needs or to arrange assistance.

<u>Musei Reali</u>

The complex includes the Royal Palace, the Royal Armoury, the Royal Library, the Sabauda Gallery, the Museum of Antiquities, and the beautifully restored Royal Gardens. Getting There & Accessibility

The museum is fully accessible to visitors with reduced mobility. There is a dedicated stepfree entrance equipped with an intercom, and wheelchairs are available upon request. Visitors with disabilities and their companions are entitled to free admission.

From Sermig, the museum is a 13-minute walk or a 6-minute bike ride. Public transport options include Tram 4 or Bus 11 from "Porta Palazzo Sud" to "Rossini," followed by a short walk.

GAM – Galleria Civica d'Arte Moderna e Contemporanea

P <u>Via Magenta, 31, 10128 Torino TO, Italy</u>

GAM is Turin's civic gallery of modern and contemporary art, home to an impressive collection of more than 47,000 works. It offers a rich journey through 19th- and 20th-century Italian and international art, alongside temporary exhibitions, events, and educational programs.

Getting There & Accessibility

GAM is fully accessible with step-free entry, elevators, and accessible restrooms. Visitors with disabilities and their companions receive free admission to the permanent collection. Reserved parking spaces are also available nearby.

From Sermig, GAM is about a 25-minute journey by public transport. You can take Bus 11 from "Porta Palazzo Sud" to "Magenta," then walk 3 minutes. By bike, it takes about 15 minutes.

Gallerie d'Italia – Torino

Piazza San Carlo, 156, 10121 Torino TO, Italy

Gallerie d'Italia in Turin is housed in the historic Palazzo Turinetti, offering a space dedicated primarily to photography and contemporary visual arts. The museum hosts a range of exhibitions and cultural events, aiming to document and promote discussions on social, cultural, and environmental issues through visual storytelling. It also features the Intesa Sanpaolo Publifoto Archive, showcasing a vast collection of 20th-century photojournalism.

Getting There & Accessibility

Pinacoteca Agnelli

Getting There & Accessibility

Pinacoteca Agnelli provides step-free access via elevators from the ground floor to the gallery and rooftop areas. The venue is equipped to accommodate visitors with reduced mobility. For specific accessibility inquiries or assistance, contacting the gallery in advance is recommended.

Getting There & Accessibility

MAUTO is fully accessible to visitors with reduced mobility, featuring step-free entrances and elevators to all exhibition areas. Accessible restrooms are also available.

From Sermig, the museum is approximately a 30-minute journey by public transport. You can take Bus 8 from "Porta Palazzo Sud" to "Valentino," followed by a short walk to the museum. By bike, it takes about 20 minutes.

<u>Polo del '900</u>

P <u>Via del Carmine, 14, 10122 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Polo del '900 is a dynamic cultural centre in Turin dedicated to 20th-century history, society, and culture. Housed within the historic Juvarra-designed San Daniele and San Celso buildings, it serves as a hub for 24 cultural institutions and associations. The centre offers a rich array of resources, including a library, archives, exhibition spaces, and hosts various events such as workshops, lectures, and performances. Its mission is to foster civic awareness and engage the community in discussions on democracy, citizenship, and social rights.

Getting There & Accessibility

Polo del '900 is committed to accessibility and inclusion. Museo Casa Mollino is about a 25-minute walk or a 12-minute bike ride from Sermig. Alternatively, you can take Bus 68 from "Borgo Dora" to "Napione," followed by a brief walk to the museum.

Recontemporary

P <u>Via Gaudenzio Ferrari, 12, 10124 Torino TO, Italy</u>

Recontemporary is Italy's first independent space exclusively dedicated to video and new media art. Established in 2018, it serves as a cultural association and community hub that promotes exhibitions, supports multimedia artists, and develops educational projects focusing on contemporary art and digital technologies. The venue hosts interactive exhibitions, workshops, and events aimed at fostering collaboration and dialogue within the international art scene.

Getting There & Accessibility from Aurora

Recontemporary offers step-free access to its facility. Visitors with reduced mobility can navigate the space comfortably. For specific accessibility inquiries or assistance, it is advisable to contact the venue in advance.

From the Aurora district, Recontemporary is approximately a 25-minute walk or a 10-minute bike ride. For public transportation, you can take Bus 68 from "Regio Parco" to "Giardini Reali," followed by a short 5-minute walk to the venue.

Imbarchino

Viale Umberto Cagni, 37, 10126 Torino TO, Italy

Imbarchino is a historic venue located in the heart of Parco del Valentino, Turin's largest park. Overlooking the Po River, it offers a serene setting for various activities. Operating from morning until late at night, Imbarchino serves breakfast, lunch, dinner, aperitivo, all types of activities, workshops, nightlife and more. While it doesn't have a traditional kitchen, the venue collaborates with local businesses to provide a selection of dishes.

The venue also functions as a study area, offering free Wi-Fi, water refills, and electrical outlets, accommodating around 30 indoor and 60 outdoor seats. Additionally, Imbarchino

hosts Radio Banda Larga (RBL), a community web radio station broadcasting live from the premises.

Getting There & Accessibility

Imbarchino is located within a natural setting, and while the main areas are at ground level, the venue can be challenging to reach for visitors with reduced mobility due to uneven terrain and limited paved access. It's best to contact the venue in advance if you need specific assistance.

From Sermig, the venue is approximately a 15-minute walk or a 7-minute bike ride. Public transport options include Tram 4 from "Porta Palazzo Sud" to "Bertola," followed by a short walk to the venue.

<u>CAP10100</u>

P Corso Moncalieri, 18, 10131 Torino TO, Italy

CAP10100 is a cultural center overlooking the river in the heart of Turin. It serves as a multipurpose space hosting a variety of events, including live music performances, theater productions, workshops, dance classes, festivals, and debates. The venue is dedicated to fostering cultural production and community engagement.
